






2007 Maryland WWF Commission – tasked with studying and making recommendations to protect and preserve Maryland's commercial fishing industry's access to public trust waters

Definition of Working Waterfronts:

"The infrastructure and places where commercial fisherman, charter fishing captains, tour boat operators, recreational fishermen, boat builders, and other small businesses conduct their business."







Program Goals:

- Define working waterfront lands, infrastructure and activities
- Identify community needs
- Offer technical and financial assistance to ensure public access and support for waterdependent businesses and industries





WWF Enhancement Grants



WHAT: Funding for a one year project to support

revitalization of working waterfront

communities and economies.

HOW MUCH: Grant awards of up to \$60,000 per year.

WHEN: RFP Spring 2017, October 2017 start

WHO: Municipalities and counties in the coastal

zone of Maryland.

Grant Conditions



Eligibility:

- Local government
- Partnership with community, non-profit, business entities
- Considers natural resources, coastal hazards, future conditions
- Land acquisition and construction projects are <u>not</u> eligible

Scope: Must result in a "program change" as defined by NOAA.




Rock Hall Waterfront Master Plan Focus of Plan

- Keep working watermen and the businesses that support them operating
- Increase other business opportunities along the waterfront
- Increase the role that the waterfront plays in making Rock Hall an attractive place to live, work, play and visit

Key Issues: Definition of Working Waterfront

"Working Waterfronts are the waterfront lands, waterfront infrastructure, and waterways that are used for a water-dependent activity, such as ports, small recreational boat harbors, fishing docks, and hundreds of other places across the country where people use and access the water."

The National Working Waterfront Network states:

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Rock Hall Waterfront Master Plan

Definition of Working Waterfront

MARITIME WATER-DEPENDENT DISTRICT

... provide for and to preserve waterfront land in appropriate locations for commercial docking, waterfront sales, storage, and repairs of boats, including out- of-water repairs, and for seafood packing and processing establishments subject to applicable sanitation and pollution laws and ordinances.

Marinas and tourist-oriented services are permitted uses, but, in general, the District is intended for more intensive marine activities dependent upon a waterfront location.









Rock Hall Waterfront Master Plan

Preserve Working Waterfront

Maintaining a stable infrastructure for watermen including:

- affordable slips and docking space
- water access (depth)
- freight vehicle access; loading; storage
- wharf conditions
- fuel availability; waste oil disposal
- maintenance and repair.





Increase economic opportunity

Identify potential waterfront enhancements to encourage and attract more users while protecting working waterfront assets.

Small business development and heritage tourism are two important assets that Rock Hall can use to increase economic activity.


