We hope you enjoy our conference, and we invite you to join us on the MPCA Board as we strive to continue *Planning for Challenges on the Horizon*.



Eli Glazier: Multimodal Transportation Planner Coordinator, Montgomery County Planning Department

Keynote Speaker

Eli Glazier will address the importance of pedestrian safety and walkability during his presentation at the Maryland Planning Commissioners Association's 39th annual conference.



Mr. Glazier is the project manager for Montgomery County's first Pedestrian Master Plan, an effort to lay the groundwork for a county where walking and rolling are safe, accessible, direct, and convenient for people of all ages and abilities.

A Transportation Planner with the Montgomery Planning Department -- part of the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission (M-NCPPC) -- Glazier will be speaking about opportunities for improving walkability through thoughtful design, supportive regulations, and policy change.

According to Glazier, "Making it easier to walk is about more than just sidewalks and crosswalks." As such, his presentation will highlight common obstacles to walkability and share the diverse recommendations of Montgomery County's new Draft Pedestrian Master Plan that aim to overcome these obstacles — including strategies that are applicable to communities both large and small.

Prior to joining Montgomery County Planning, Glazier worked as a planner for Toole Design, a national active transportation planning and design firm based in Silver Spring, Maryland, where he helped communities across the country make it easier and safer to walk and bike. Glazier received his undergraduate degree in International Politics from Pennsylvania State University and earned his master's degree in Planning from the University of Southern California.

10:00 a.m. Open Meetings Act Training

In the 2017 legislative session, the Maryland General Assembly passed legislation requiring at least one member of each public body to take a training class on the Open Meetings Act. Under current law, each public body must designate at least one individual who is an employee, officer, or member to take the training class. While employees or staff can continue to take the training class, at least one member of the public body must be also designated to take the class. This training satisfies the requirement.

Carroll Creek Linear Park, Historic Downtown Frederick

October 25, 2022, 3:00 – 5:00 p.m.

Did you know that Frederick City has one of the largest downtown historic districts and successful brownfield redevelopment programs areas on the East Coast?

Participants and tour leaders will gather at Union Mills brewery and walk to the site of the future Downtown Hotel and Conference Center, adjacent to Carroll Creek Linear Park, for a joint discussion of the project.

Situated prominently in the historic district, the site comprises both the former main terminal building of the Hagerstown & Frederick Railway and the former Byerly Tannery site. More recently it was the home of the city's local newspaper, the Frederick News Post.

Following the discussion, participants may then select from one of two tours: Tour 1 will focus on historic preservation and adaptive re-use of an historic site. Tour 2 will focus on the redevelopment of former industrial/brownfields sites, along Carroll Creek.

Tour 1 – Led by Lisa Mroszczyk Murphy, AICP, Historic Preservation Planner for the City of Frederick

This tour will feature the Visitation Hotel Frederick, downtown's largest adaptive use project currently under construction. The former campus of the Sisters of the Visitation convent and girls' school (ca. 1840s) will soon be home to 57 standard hotel rooms, 10 extended-stay rooms, and 11 condominiums. This project made use of federal rehabilitation tax credits.



**Tour 2 – Led by Richard Griffin, CeCD, AICP,
Director of Economic Development, City of Frederick**

This tour will brownfields redevelopment sites to the east along Carroll Creek, as well as address the innovative flood mitigation/stormwater engineering of Carrol Creek that has enabled the revitalization of the downtown district.

State Agencies Addressing Climate Change

New Water Resources Planning Guidance: Integrating Climate Change (0.75 AICP CM Credit)

Climate change impacts upon Maryland water resources (e.g., saltwater intrusion) and Maryland water resource infrastructure (e.g., failing septic systems due to higher groundwater tables, inadequate stormwater conveyance systems given higher precipitation amounts) are already being experienced and are accelerating in pace and extent in Maryland. The Maryland Department of the Environment and the Maryland Department of Planning will present on the Water Resources Element (WRE) Guidance Update website and climate change impacts on water resources and water resource infrastructure. The WRE is a requirement of municipal and county comprehensive plans. The presentation will include a discussion of the variety of climate change impacts on local water resources and water resource infrastructure, and will also review the WRE guidance specifics, including when the local WREs should be updated. **(ROOM C/D)**

Transportation Planning: Supporting Federal and State Climate Action Strategies While Achieving MDOT's Mission (.75 AICP CM Credit)

This session will cover Maryland Department of Transportation (MDOT) led initiatives that support Maryland's overall goal of achieving 60% greenhouse gas emissions reductions over 2006 levels by 2031. Initiatives to be covered include the Maryland State Plan for National Electric Vehicle Infrastructure (NEVI) Formula Funding Deployment, the MDOT Urban Tree Program, and new grant funding programs within the Infrastructure Improvement and Jobs Act. We will talk about the plan and program goals; opportunities for community input, involvement, and funding support; and how the changing climate in Maryland requires a coordinated and deliberate approach to ensure successful outcomes. Challenges for discussion include barriers to electric vehicle charging infrastructure deployment and tree plantings in Maryland communities, particularly those in urban areas; how to address flooding concerns related to aging stormwater infrastructure in a multi-jurisdictional watershed; and effective approaches to accelerate electric vehicle adoption. **(ROOM B)**

Determination of Consistency with the Comprehensive Plan (1.5 AICP CM Credits)

What is the role of the Planning Commission (PC) to determine Consistency? How does the consideration come to the PC? What types of matters require a determination of Consistency [e.g., decisions related to the County Water and Sewer Plan (CWSP), Priority Funding Areas (PFAs) and Annexations.]? Secretary McCord provides comprehensive leadership of the Department's mission, objectives, and initiatives. With the Maryland Department of Planning since 2015. He has served as Assistant Secretary of Operations and Deputy Secretary. The secretary comes to Planning with private sector and public experience. He worked in private practice in Bel Air, MD before joining the Harford County Law Department in 1998 as Deputy County Attorney, then County Attorney from 2004 -2014. He has overseen issues from Western Maryland to the Eastern Shore as a trustee on the Local Government Insurance Trust. He is an Adjunct Professor, University of Baltimore School of Law, 1990 - present. Jan H. Gardner

Frederick County Executive

Jan H. Gardner was elected as Frederick County's first County Executive in 2014 and is currently serving her second term. Executive Gardner previously served as a County Commissioner for 12 years from 1998 to 2010, including four years as President of the Board

of County Commissioners.

Executive Gardner's priorities are education, jobs, seniors, and community needs. Key initiatives include accelerating school construction; Livable Frederick, a new, innovative and strategic approach to planning for the future; Seniors First, to engage and empower a growing senior population; and advancing affordable housing, sustainability, and equity initiatives.

Ms. Gardner currently serves on the Board of the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments. She is also a Past President of the Maryland Association of Counties (MACo) and past member of the Board of Directors. She currently serves on the MACo Legislative Committee. Ms. Gardner is currently a member of the Frederick County Fire and Rescue Advisory Board, the Business and Industry Advisory Cabinet, and the Tourism Council of Frederick County Board of Directors. Her business experience includes accounting, operations planning and new product development for the Quaker Oats Company, a Fortune 100 company.

Ms. Gardner gained valuable federal government experience as the State Director for U.S. Senator Barbara A. Mikulski. She earned an MBA from Xavier University and a BBA in finance and economics from the University of Notre Dame. Ms. Gardner also graduated from the Rawlings Leadership Training Program through the University of Maryland. She was awarded the President's Medal for Leadership from St. John's Catholic Preparatory School and the Theodore W. Stephens Lifetime Achievement Award for her outstanding contributions to Human Relations. She was named one of Maryland's Top 100 Women by the Daily Record three times and is a member of the Circle of Excellence.



Michael O'Connor

Mayor, City of Frederick

Frederick City Mayor, Michael O'Connor, was born in Frederick. He graduated from Saint John's at Prospect Hall High School (now Saint John's Catholic Prep) in 1984, and Saint Bonaventure University, with a double major in history and mass communications, in 1988. Michael spent nearly 20 years in local media as a reporter, news director, talk show host, senior producer, and moderator with WJEJ, Hagerstown (1988 to 1989), WFMD-WFRE, Frederick (1989 to 1997), and Comcast (Adelphia, GS Communications) Cable Channel 10, Frederick (1997 to 2006).

Prior to becoming Mayor in 2017, Michael served as the business manager at Saint Katharine Drexel Roman Catholic Congregation in Frederick. He also spent nine years as adjunct faculty at Frederick Community College (2000 to 2009). Michael was first elected to the Board of Aldermen, in 2009, and was re-elected in 2013. He has been the chair of the Streets and Sanitation Committee, and the aldermanic liaison to the Airport Commission, Celebrate Frederick and Delaplaine Visual Arts Center Boards, Historic Preservation Commission, and Parks and Recreation Commission. He also represented the Alderman on the Blight and Vacant Property Task Force.

Michael is a member of the Community Action Agency and Tourism Council Boards, the Maryland Municipal League Board of Directors and Legislative Committee, and the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments Board of Directors.



Presenters



Adam Snyder

Adam Snyder joined the Maryland Department of Planning (Planning) in early May 2022. As Principal Counsel Adam heads up the division of the Maryland Attorney General's Office that provides advice to Planning, the Maryland Historical Trust (MHT), and various other state entities, and represents them

in litigation, as necessary. He is currently representing MHT in two lawsuits involving the administration of historic preservation easements in Baltimore City. Adam worked with the Office of Attorney General for 25 years with his first 13 years representing the Maryland Department of the Environment's (MDE) Wetlands and Waterways Program in cases involving the environmental effects of land development. Over the next six years, Adam served as the Office's Chief of Opinions, followed by another half-dozen years representing the state of Maryland in federal appellate litigation.



April Ishak

A graduate of Rutgers University and Rutgers School of Law-Camden, April C. Ishak, began her legal career more than 25 years ago representing parties in class and derivative stockholder litigation in the Delaware Court of Chancery. She shifted her career to practice law with her husband in Bel Air, Maryland in 2009.

April's interest in municipal law developed while working at the Bel Air law firm, which represented municipalities in Harford County. In 2017, April was appointed City Attorney for the City of Havre de Grace. She opened her solo practice in June 2018. The remainder of her legal practice is dedicated to estate planning, estate administration, business law, and civil litigation. Governor Hogan appointed April in 2015 to serve on the three-member Open Meetings Compliance Board. She was re-appointed and served as Chairperson until her term expired in June 2020. She was recently appointed by Governor Hogan to serve on the State Advisory Council on Administrative Hearings. April is also a member of the Maryland Municipal Attorneys Association and is General Counsel to the Maryland Federation of Republican Women (MFRW). In 2020, April began teaching Open Meetings Act classes for the Academy for Excellence in Local Governance.



Chris Drummond

Christopher (Chris) Drummond is currently serving as an attorney with multiple Maryland Eastern Shore jurisdictions, including the municipalities of Chestertown, Denton, and Secretary, as well as the counties of Dorchester, Kent, and Queen Anne's.

Chris previously represented the Town of Oxford on the Port Wardens litigation and served as the attorney to the Town of Easton Board of Appeals from 1994–2004. Chris graduated from the University of Maryland School of Law with honors in 1980 and was admitted to the Maryland Bar later the same year.



Chuck Boyd, AICP

Mr. Boyd is the Director of Planning Coordination within the Maryland Department of Planning's Division of Planning Services. He is responsible for coordinating, preparing, and implementing major policy and management initiatives related to local planning assistance, environmental planning, and

infrastructure policy planning. Tasked with a wide range of assignments, he works with staff from the department, other State agencies, local officials, stakeholders, and the public. He has over 30 years of planning experience working in both the public and private sector.



Cindy Unangst

Cynthia A. (Cindy) Unangst, has been the staff planner for the Town of Middletown, MD, for 16 years.

Previously she was an environmental planner for Bucks County Planning Commission in Pennsylvania.

She has a bachelor's degree in forestry from Michigan Technological University, and a master's degree

in natural resource management from the University of Michigan.

Cindy also worked for many years as the zoning administrator for Middletown, as well as the staff planner and zoning administrator for the Town of Myersville. She is a member of the American Institute of Certified Planners (AICP).

Eric Soter is a land planner with over 25 years of experience in the Baltimore-Washington Region. He is employed by Rodgers Consulting, Inc., a local land development planning and engineering consulting firm known for being at the forefront of the New Urbanist movement. Since the 1980s, the firm has

created successful mixed-use communities across Maryland, including Kentlands and Lakelands in Gaithersburg, Cabin Branch in Clarksburg, and the Villages of Urbana and Linganore Town Center in Frederick County. As a client principal, Eric is part of a team of experts focused on securing clients' project entitlements including annexations, zoning changes, and subdivision, site development and related plan approvals and permits. Previously, Eric served as Director of Planning and Community Development for Frederick County Maryland as well Urban Design Director for the City of Gaithersburg. He has served on a number of local boards including the Land Use Council of the Frederick County Building Industry Association, the Interfaith Housing Alliance, the Public Policy Committee of the Frederick County Chamber. Eric also previously served on the Maryland Sustainable Growth Commission and their APFO Workgroup.





Frank Johnson

Frank Johnson has served local government in a variety of roles – as a staff member, an appointed official, and an elected official – and in those roles has worked on Open Meetings Act issues in several contexts since 2000. He is certified by the Academy for Excellence in Local Governance as an Open Meetings Act trainer.

After serving on several local boards and commissions, including the Planning Commission _which one?, Frank was elected to the Mt. Airy Town Council in 2000, and as Mayor in 2006. He has served as an appellate attorney for the U.S. Department of Justice and as Assistant Attorney for Carroll and Montgomery counties, and since 2014 as an attorney for the City of Gaithersburg. There he serves as counsel to the Planning Commission, Board of Appeals, Historic District Commission, and several other city boards.

Gary Mauler



Gary Mauler received his bachelor's degree in electrical engineering from the University of Maryland and is currently an engineer at Northrop Grumman Corporation. He has been a member for the past 25 years of the Jessup Improvement Association and currently serves as a board member. Gary has served on past general development plan committees in

Anne Arundel County, and is a former member of the Dewey Beach, Delaware Planning and Zoning Board. His goal is to work within the CAC to develop a vision that reflects the wishes of the citizens of Anne Arundel County and advocate for changes to the county code to guarantee it will be implemented as planned.



Gerritt Knaap

Gerritt Knaap is professor of Urban Studies and Planning, Director of the National Center for Smart Growth, and Associate Dean for Research and Creative Activity in the School of Architecture Planning and Preservation at the University of Maryland. He received his PhD in economics from the University

of Oregon and is the coauthor or coeditor of over 80 peer referenced journal articles and ten books. For the past 20 years, Gerritt has served on the state's Smart Growth Sub-cabinet and for ten years has served on the state's Sustainable Growth Commission. In 2021, Gerritt moved to Frederick and currently serves on the city's Zoning Board of Appeals.



Heather Murphy

Heather Murphy has served the Director for the Office of Planning and Capital Programming, previously serving as Deputy Director, at Maryland Department of Transportation Secretary's Office (MDOT TSO) for the last 15 years. As Director, Heather oversees the development of the Governor's Capital Transportation Program, the state's long-range transportation plan, and the annual Attainment Report, MDOT TSO's performance management report.
