I. MARYLAND STATE DATA CENTER

The Maryland State Data Center Program is designed to improve access to and use of statistical resources available from the United States Bureau of the Census and other sources. The State Data Center provides user services through consultation on data products and services by telephone, correspondence, personal visits, or referral.

Services in Maryland are provided through a cooperative agreement between the Maryland Department of State Planning, the State Library Resource Center and the University of Maryland. The Department is the program coordinator.

Services of the State Data Center are augmented by a network of locally affiliated data centers. These include regional planning organizations and local libraries.

Census Bureau products and services located in the State Data Center include all major statistical programs in printed form, micro fiche and on computer tape files.

The State Data Center responds to inquiries and provides consultation on data products and services. Assistance is available on such topics as:

- . Availability of data on particular subjects
- . Data interpretation and analyses
- . Sources of data
- . Population Projections
- . Computer software applications
- . Processing machine-readable products
- . Geographical referencing
- . Use of data for modeling and analytical applications
- . Use of administrative records

The State Data Center maintains files from which special tabulations covering specific geographic or subject matter areas can be prepared. All summary tape files will be available at the Center. Cost recovery charges will generally be in effect if computer or other significant resources are required.

The Maryland Department of State Planning provides user inquiry and consultative services, data analysis and processing of machine readable files. The Department also conducts training in the use of census data and maintains other related major statistical resources as appropriate.

The Computer Science Center, University of Maryland services user requests for machine readable data and conducts training in computer based retrieval methods for the University community.

The State Library Resource Center provides public inquiry and referral services and coordinates local libraries designated as affiliate data centers.






Dear Mr. Taylor:







MARYLAND FAMILY INCOME CHARACTERISTICS - 1970 CENSUS




1995 TIGER Improvement Project




Figure 12—Local reference source map

- Find the street segment on your local reference source shown in Figure 12 (you may use other sources of information) and . . .

Figure 14—Key numbers on the TIP Cluster listing

- Add the street to TIP Tract map and label it with the appropriate key numbers from 10 the cluster listing. On Figure 14, you can see the key numbers are "1" for the even address range and "2" for the odd addresses. By using key numbers you avoid annotating the street name and individual address ranges on many map updates (we also get the 9-digit ZIP Code).




Figure 13—Tract map before update

- try to find the street on the TIP Tract map. On Figure 13, the 300 block of Maple Rd is missing from the TIGER data base.




Figure 15—Update Tract map


- Circle the key numbers on the map so we don't confuse them with other address annotations and draw a small arrow next to each in the direction that the addresses are increasing (see Figure 15.) This will allow us to enter the range into the TIGER data base correctly.



2. Operational Overview

2.1 Operation Purpose

The Group Quarters (GQ) operation enumerates people living or staying in Group Quarters, people experiencing homelessness, and people receiving service at service-based locations.

2.2 Background

Group Quarters comprises a diverse range of group living arrangements, including specialized institutional and non-institutional facilities. Resident services provided at GQs may include custodial or medical care as well as other types of assistance, and residency is commonly restricted to those receiving these services. Service-Based Enumeration (SBE) enumerates people experiencing homelessness and receiving some type of service at service-based locations, such as emergency shelters or soup kitchens. GQs include such places as college residence halls, residential treatment centers, skilled nursing facilities, group homes, correctional facilities, maritime vessels, workers' dormitories, and domestic violence shelters (DVS). Residence criteria for the 2020 Census to determine what is considered a GQ have been published in the Federal Register (81 FR 42577). The Census Bureau is reviewing comments with final residence criteria to be determined in late 2017 to inform the 2020 Census GQ operation.
