Background

Senate Bill 278 from the 2010 session of the Maryland General Assembly established the Maryland Sustainable Growth Commission. The Maryland Sustainable Growth Commission transforms 2007-2010's Task Force on the Future for Growth and Development into a permanent commission to advise on growth and development issues in the State.

Prior to the creation of the Task Force in 2007, there was no statewide forum where stakeholders could gather to discuss growth and development issues and policies. The former Economic Growth, Resource Protection and Planning Commission, which was created by the 1992 Growth Act, was allowed to sunset in 2003. The creation of a permanent Commission creates a broader and more established forum to consider and make recommendations on growth and development issues.

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2010 Sustainable Communities Legislation

The Maryland General Assembly passed and Governor O'Malley signed two important Smart, Green and Growing bills in the 2010 General Assembly session for the future of growth, development and sustainability in Maryland. MDP joins its community of partners, advocates and stakeholders in implementing the **Sustainable Communities Act of 2010** (House Bill 475 ) and supporting the **Maryland Sustainable Growth Commission** (House Bill 474 and Senate Bill 278 )

Overall these new Smart, Green & Growing laws inspire new thinking for sustainable growth and development in Maryland and guarantees that its objectives can be achieved.



Governor O'Malley signed the Sustainable Communities Act of 2010 into law on May 20, 2010

Sustainable Communities Act of 2010 (House Bill 475)

The Sustainable Communities Act of 2010 strengthens reinvestment and revitalization in Maryland's older communities by reinventing an existing rehabilitation tax credit and extending the life of the credit through 2014, simplifying the framework for designated target areas in the Community Legacy (CL) and Neighborhood BusinessWorks (NBW) program by creating "Sustainable Communities", establishing a new transportation focus on older communities, and enhancing the role of the Smart Growth Subcabinet (SGSC) in the revitalization of communities.

Smart Growth in Maryland
Smart growth concentrates new development and redevelopment in areas that have existing or planned infrastructure to avoid sprawl. Smart growth is sustainable and is characterized by compact, transit-oriented, bicycle-friendly land use, with neighborhood schools, walkable streets, mixed-use development and a wide range of housing choices. Its purpose is to conserve valuable natural resources through the efficient use of land, water and air; foster economic development and job growth in towns and cities; expand transportation, employment, and housing choices; distribute the costs and benefits of development in an equitable manner; and promote public health. Smart Growth has four straightforward goals:

- Support existing communities by targeting resources to support development in areas where infrastructure exists
- Save our most valuable natural resources before they are forever lost
- Save taxpayers from the high cost of building infrastructure to serve development that has spread far from our traditional population centers
- Provide Marylanders with a high quality of life, whether they choose to live in a rural community, suburb, small town, or city

Sustainable Communities
Maryland has been at the forefront of many policy innovations to improve access to affordable housing, create more transportation options and lower costs, while investing in cities, protecting the environment, and mitigating the effects of climate change. State agencies, the Task Force on the Future for Growth and Development, local government agencies and a variety of stakeholders are working on a broad approach to apply the principles of Sustainable Communities in Maryland.

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Projections

This section contains long-range projections (out to 2030) for population, households, labor force, jobs and total and per-capita personal income. In addition, projections are available for total public school enrollment out 10 years. Note that a projection differs from an estimate in that projections deals with the future while an estimate is for either the current year or a past time period. Some socioeconomic estimates are found under the estimates tab, while estimates of Jobs by Place of Work and Personal Income can be found at the Jobs and Income Tab. A good summary of estimates covering a wide variety of socioeconomic variables are also contained in our 2008 Maryland Statistical Handbook.

Long-range projections are organized in two ways: 1) by county and region where data across all projected series are displayed on one-page summaries for each selected geography, and 2) by projection topic, where each projection (e.g. population) is shown across for all counties and regions.

Welcome to MDP's Property Map and Data Products

The Maryland Department of Planning (MDP) annually updates the more than 2,800 property maps, or tax maps, for Maryland's 23 counties - Baltimore City maintains its own property maps. MDP distributes these maps to the public in electronic DVD format, online or as paper tax maps with no included data.

Maryland's tax maps are updated and maintained electronically as part of MDP's Geographic Information Systems (GIS) database. The tax maps are then combined with recent parcel information from the Maryland State Department of Assessments and Taxation as individual parcel records are linked to their property locations on the tax maps.

Tax Maps, Parcel data, Computer Assisted Mass Appraisal (CAMA) data, recent Sale data and associated layers including aerial imagery, ZIP code boundary files, land use/land cover data, census geography and census demographic data, Priority Funding Area (PFA) designations, legislative and congressional district boundary files, flood plain data, generalized zoning designations, protected land boundaries, sewer service area boundaries and (except for FINDER Online) residential Sales x,y point files for CY 2008-2002 derived from the SDAT parcel data are available through MDP as:



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The costs of sprawl

Debate about sprawl development has shifted over the years. What was once a discussion heavily about aesthetics, sign pollution and traffic has grown into an examination of long-term costs and sustainability. The past two generations' worth of building patterns have markedly changed the shape of both urban and rural areas. Air and water quality, greenhouse gases, the availability of workforce housing, the vitality of Main Street businesses, our cultural and historic resources, even public health have been affected by dispersed patterns of development. The issue demands more public attention. We offer this compilation of various outside resources to promote greater dialogue about the costs of sprawl.



What began as a flood control strategy became a signature example of Smart Growth land use.

1. Carroll Creek

This dramatic redevelopment and revitalization project in Frederick started as a flood control project to reinvigorate economic growth. More than \$1.50 million in private investment is planned or underway for a mix of new construction, infill and historic renovation. When completed, more than 400,000 square feet of office space, 150,000 square feet of commercial and retail space and nearly 300 residential units are expected to be built. About \$11 million in improvements have been completed to date, including brick pedestrian paths, water features, planters with shade trees and plantings, pedestrian bridges and a 350-seat amphitheater for outdoor performances. Carroll Creek was honored as the 2007 Project of the Year by the Maryland chapter of the American Planning Association.
